Anti Bullying Production

We were very lucky to be visited by Firehorse Productions theatre company on Thursday morning. The production was all about bullying. Children learnt about the different types of bullying and that bullying is something that happens 'Several Times On Purpose' (STOP). We reminded all of the children that if they are worried about bullying they should speak to an adult. In school, Mrs Bayliss Hare is our Behaviour Lead and Mrs Cumberbeach is available to talk to children about any worries that they may have about on-line bullying. We have also revised our behaviour policy, which is now on our website. Please take the time to read this document and ask if you have any questions.

The actors performing asked the children about different types of bullying and from this it became apparent that our children are worried about cyberbullying. 90% of young people do not tell adults about online bullying issues and girls are twice as likely to experience cyberbullying than boys. This Wednesday, we performed "Jonah the Groaner". This story is often remembered for the whale or big fish; but of course Jonah is

the main character.

At first, Jonah didn't want to do what God was asking of him and he moaned about it. Eventually, though, he realised that God was right, he obeyed God and stopped moaning.

Science Week

We started Science Week off with an assembly given by Mrs Pollard, who teaches science at Woking High School. She looked at what the children imagined a scientist would look like and what job they would do, challenged their perceptions and talked to them about the many and varied jobs there are within science.

Year 3 had a really enjoyable Science Week. During the week we have studied plant life cycles, planted a variety of seeds to see how they grow (cress, mustard and radish). We also looked at modern farm methods and attempted to



design some new technology that might help farmers be more efficient. Later in the week, we explored our school environment for insects.

We then made our own bug hotels which you might spot around the school. Finally we looked at the human skeleton and began to learn the names of some of the bones in our bodies.

Year 4 have had fun this week being scientists. We explored which material made the best thermal insulators. We wrapped the material around ice cubes (in the shape of the Titanic!) and measured how long it took them to melt.

We also made bouncy eggs by soaking them in vinegar, and explored how the human body digests food using digestive biscuits, orange juice and tights. It was very messy!

Year 5 drew the human body, looking at what makes us the same and what makes us different.

Year 6 became fingerprint experts when we looked at the different types of fingerprints you can have. We found out that most of our class had 'arch' and 'loop' patterns. It is amazing to know that no two people can have the same



fingerprints! We had some exciting detective work to do when we had to find out who the intruder was in our classroom. It was an active afternoon of learning!

Year 6 also investigated their taste buds on their tongues to find out whether they were: non-tasters, tasters or super tasters. It was great fun and surprising to find out that the amount of fungiform papillae (the bumps that contain the taste buds) varies from person to person.
