Dear Parents and Carers

I have enjoyed seeing the children engage in some new learning this week. Our Year 4 children have started xylophone lessons with Surrey Arts and we had a violin teacher, Mrs Lawrence, come into school on Friday to show the Year 3 children all about the violin. Mrs Lawrence is an excellent violin teacher and is keen to start teaching our children. We will be sending out more information about how the children can have lessons with her over the coming days.

School Council has now met twice – via Microsoft Teams. We are coming up with new ideas for toys on the playground and how we can stay connected as a school family. Watch this space!

As I am sure many of you are aware, COVID cases are rising across the county. Many schools in this area have had to close down school bubbles, which results in 14 days of isolation for children affected and their families. We have been very fortunate up to now in that we have managed to remain fully open and our attendance has been over 95% for the majority of this past week. There is a danger that as we adjust to the 'new normal' we become complacent, so I would like to remind parents of the following:

1. When collecting your child, please maintain a 2m distance from other parents and leave the site promptly.
2. Once you have collected your child, they must remain by your side if you are collecting other siblings. This is to prevent mixing of school bubbles.
3. Please do not stand outside the school gates but move away as quickly as you can.
4. Wear a facemask on the school site.
5. If you have children at Woking High, please remind them to walk on the opposite side of the road to the school. This helps ease congestion at the gates and reduces the risk of infection between the two schools. Unfortunately, Woking High children cannot come onto site to pick up siblings.
6. Endeavour to drop off your child at the correct time. The timetable for drop off is below. Do not drop off your child before 8 30am as this leads to crowding at the gates. If you require before school childcare, please contact our Breakfast Club provider.

Most of our staff work in their year group bubbles but some staff, like myself, do move around the building. We wear masks, frequently wash our hands, and maintain 2m distancing. From next week, we will be wearing pink lanyards as a visual reminder to the children to maintain their distance from those adults who are not part of a bubble. I would be grateful if you could re-enforce this message at home, as it can be difficult for children to remember!

Thank you for your support. In these difficult times, partnership between families and school is even more important as we work hard to keep our school open and safe.

Composer of the Month:

Louis Armstrong

Louis Armstrong was born in 1901 in New Orleans, the "Birthplace of Jazz." Louis had a tricky childhood but at the age of 11, he started to play the cornet (a small brass instrument similar to a trumpet). Louis became a great player and soon started playing in bands all over America. In 1924 he moved to New York and started to play the trumpet. Louis Armstrong became one of the most famous jazz musicians of the 20th century. He was a singer since his childhood, a master of the trumpet, and even a dancer in musicals. This week the Year 4 children had their first Glockenspiel and Xylophone lesson delivered by Surrey Arts.


They talked about different music styles and learnt about the beat and rhythm by clapping patterns and playing their instruments using the 'G' key. The children also got to play their names on the instruments.

Wearing PE kits to school



Poetry Afternoon with Joshua Seigal

Last Friday, as part of our Reading is Magic Festival, we had a brilliant afternoon joining Ravenscote School for a Zoom call with the poet, Joshua Seigal. He read his energetic poetry and answered live questions from the children. It was a lot of fun and everyone enjoyed it immensely. He spoke to the children about writing poetry, performed some brand new, exclusive poems and performed his poem, 'Addicted to Chicken' which the children loved.

He then wrote us a letter:



"Hello everyone at Horsell Junior School. I like your school because it has the name 'horse' in it. My name is Joshua Seigal, and I am a poet. One day in the future some of you might even get the chance to meet me.

I am really delighted that your teacher decided to make a fool of themselves by performing my poem 'addicted to chicken'. I'd like to say a couple of things about this poem.

The first thing is the story behind the poem. One time when I was visiting a school, a boy came up to me and said he didn't like poetry. This happens a lot, and I even decided to call my first book 'I Don't Like Poetry'. Anyway, I told him that I would write him a poem about anything he wanted, and he chose chicken. I really hate this, so if you ever meet me, do NOT call me Chicken Man. Anyway, my name is Joshua Seigal. It would be amazing if some of you wanted to buy my books, because that is what enables me to make a living as a poet. 
