Horsell Junior School will be open to parents and carers on **6th March from 2pm** for you to find out more about OPAL, speak to our play ambassadors and share an OPAL playtime with your child. At the end of the afternoon, classrooms will be open for you to look at your child's work.

We ask that all parents attending bring a donation to support our playtimes. Please see the list below:

The children explored some artefacts, asked some great questions and were guided in a five-minute meditation which they found very relaxing.



INTER-HOUSE MATHS COMPETITION

There were several, thrilling rounds in the lower school inter-house maths competition this week, showcasing the mathematical prowess and teamwork of the competing houses.

In the initial round, participants faced individual questions to test their mathematical skills. At the end of the round, Hatchlands and Polesdon found themselves tied for second place, each accumulating 33 points. However, it was Clandon who claimed the lead with a commendable 40 points.

The competition intensified in the second round, where students engaged in head-to-head battles, testing their knowledge of times tables against their peers in the same class. Following this round, the leaderboard saw some reshuffling. Hatchlands surged ahead to claim second place with 42 points, while Clandon maintained their lead with 43 points. Loseley climbed to third place with 40 points, and Polesdon slipped to fourth with 38 points.

The climax of the competition arrived with the third and final round, focusing on group problem-solving and resilience, particularly centred around perimeter calculations. This round proved pivotal as Hatchlands showcased remarkable teamwork and mathematical acumen, propelling them to victory with an impressive total score of 49 points. **Well done Hatchlands!**

Surrey County Council are consulting with all residents in Surrey regarding a new road safety strategy which aims to cut road collisions resulting in death or serious injury, to zero by 2050.

What is Surrey County Council's Vision Zero Strategy?

The strategy includes a new policy for introducing 20 mph speed limits, focusing on schools, residential areas and town centres. They would like the views of local people before developing any new scheme. There is no intention that this will be a blanket approach to 20mph limits.
